Halloween Horrors



There is still space available for the SOLAR horseback riding trip scheduled for the weekend of October 8-10!



Tech-Tips

Winter Rock Climbing

The last opportunities for rock climbing with the SOLAR club are coming to an end for the year and the winter weather will soon be hitting the mountains. Where can rock climbing enthusiasts go to keep up their skills as well as enjoy the challenges? There are several gyms with indoor rock climbing facilities.

Indoor Climbing sights: Most of you are familiar with the Benchmark's 18 foot indoor climbing wall in Farmington, where many SOLARites experienced their first climb. It is open all year. However, many of you may not be aware of gyms in southeast Michigan that are a lot bigger.

In Albion is the Stam Commonwealth, located on the Albion College campus at the Arnold Barn. Just outside Grand Rapids is Inside Moves gym. Vertical Ventures in Lansing offers advanced classes during the week. See Sharon Stanek for more details (phone 565-3080).

"The way I teach is different than older climbers and teachers based on changes." said Sharon. "I try to be up on recent and upcoming safety features, procedures, and ethics."

Sharon has been rock climbing for seven years. In 1991 she was the assistant instructor and primary instructor this year for the SOLAR rock climbers. She credits her association with Vertical Ventures for her up-to-date knowledge of the field. They offer advanced classes for SOLAR members who want to take the next step. There is generally one instructor per two students.

The number of rock climbers is increasing. Benchmark's sales in rock climbing equipment have increased by 400 percent. However, rock climbing opportunities are still limited.


Good weather Rock Climbing Locations:

Climbers can go to Grand Ledge, near Lansing; Michigan's upper peninsula (Porcupine Mountains); Rattlesnake Provincial Park, near Toronto (which is actually closer than the U.P.); or any of several parks in Pennsylvania.

Because of this shortage of sites, Sharon Stresses that individuals and groups are encouraged to not monopolize the climb.

"Grand Ledge is very friendly," says Sharon. "You can go dimb even if you don't know anybody. Just say, "Will you give me a ride on your rope?" "

Indiana Adventure

Hurry! There's still time to Sign up for Indiana, October 8 through 10. For those of you reluctant to drive the three hours to the Chain O' Lakes State Park to canoe, hike, play games eat, search for Herons, song birds leat, search for deer, fox, mink, and eat; well here is something else to consider. On the way down on I-69 get off on Indiana 20 at Angola and head west to H-5 and north to Shipshewana. an Amish community. On Friday they run a horse auction that lacks equal in North America. There also is a GIANT flea market.

On Sunday we can leave the state park early and drive the few miles to the Pigeon River state fish and wildlife area. This hauntingly beautiful stream, edged with tush vegetation, checked with hyacinths, flows through an outstanding variety of habitats, marshes, meadows, woods, swamps and bogs. Some 216 species of birds attract bird watchers to the area.

So join us Friday October 8 at our campfire at Chain O' Lakes, for an included Saturday breakfast, canoe with us Saturday, and a big pot-luck that night. There is a shelter in case of rain. Seturday night, the park service is hosting a session on Halloween stories. Sunday we'll hike, picnic or go to other parks.



Overall Winner: Cajun Chicken Stir-Fry by John Gulas.

Amounts may vary with taste. John measured in pinches and handfuls. This is a mish-mash of other recipes he has made.

Ingredients:

Cajun Spice Curry Powder Chicken Breast (skinless)

Broccoli

Onion

Zucchini

Green Pepper

Tomato(e)s

Butter

Optional:

Squash

Chop veggies in advance. Cut chicken into strips and bread with curry powder / cajun spice mix. Put butter and chicken in skillet and brown slightly. Add veggies. Cook until chicken is blackened. If done properly, the pan will be difficult to clean. Best served with rice pilaf, garlic cheese bread, and wine. John assumes this is good even if not prepared in the back of a blue pick up truck.

Spices Below (step 3) Cut above meats, onion and ginger and cook separately until almost. done - times are in parentheses.

- 2) Add to 6 cups water, add rice mix and bring to boil for 10 minutes. then add mushrooms, peas, red pepper, com, cajun sauce, coconut milk and beer. Stir and simmer.
- 3) Add spices at all stages and while simmering: Garlic pwd, turmeric, curry pwd, cinnamon pwd, currin pwd, coriander pwd, chili pwd, oregano. salt paprika and onion pwd, red-white-black pepper.
