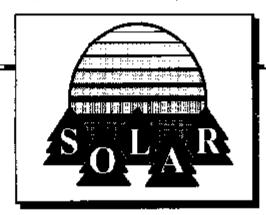

Saturday the weather would be 85, low humidity, and sunny. We hiked in the woods and by the river, always under the trees, and wondered "Where's Doug?"

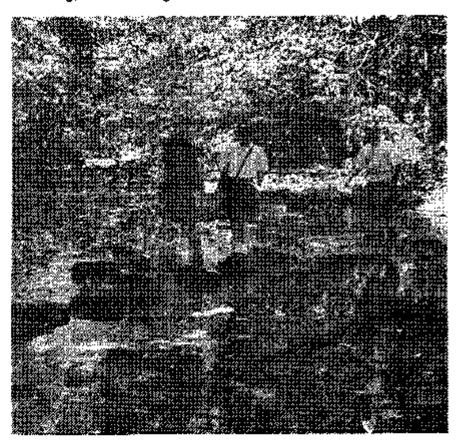

### Wilderness First-Aid Class

It's been a common joke that gets kicked around backpacking groups that when someone gets hurt you should just shoot them and devide up their stuff. Not any more, SOLAR is offering a Wildemess First Aid Class.

In conjunction with Doug Brown, Paramedic and Owner/Operator of Michigan Search and Rescue, SOLAR is sponsoring a wilderness first aid class. The class will be held the weekend of August 12-14 at Waterloo Recreation Area near Chelsea, Michigan.

The class will involve 16 hours of instruction and hands-on practical experience in wilderness first aid techniques. A written and practical exam will be held at the end of the class. The text for the class will be the NOLS Wilderness First Aid text. Students will be expected to begin class having read the designated chapters in the text. The times for the class will be Sat. 9 a.m. to 7 or 8 p.m. and Sun. 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Students can arrive anytime after 3.p.m. on Friday to claim their spot in the cabin and have a free evening if they wish, or arrive Saturday morning but must be on time.

The cost of the class is \$80 per person which includes the text, instruction insurance fee, and cabin fee. Students must purchase their own vehicle permits for \$4 per cabin night. Students must bring their own food and camping supplies for the weekend. The cabin is rustic with bunk beds, wood burning stove, no electricity, and an outhouse.

Tech Tips

An important consideration, often overlocked by mountain bikers, is the length of the chainstay on their bike.

Most off the sehlf ATBs have 19 inch chainstays which are too long. The shorter you are the more important this is. You will have a very difficult time even getting traction while standing, and will find yourself climbing all hills in a sitting postion.

"There's a lot of up sides to having a shorter chainstay," said Frank Marchetti of D & D Bicycles. "It will keep your weight over your rear wheel. It makes your rear end faster so you can clear things. And, if you can't poer up it, you can creep up it."

Serious trail riders who do extremely steep climbs often have to have their ATBs custom designed with chainstays at their ideal length of around 16.5 inches. There are a few ATBs on the market at 18 inches, which is good for high-speed descending or for touring with paniers.

Bikers can call up the manufacturers and speak to the technical support people. cont only for recommendations, but to see what new things are coming on the market.

There's another reason why a shorter chainstay is desireable. "The shorter your rear end, the less fatibue and flex," said Marchetti.
