
Arkona Fossil Hunt





Rattlesnake Ragu

it's more than just a name. This recipe took the prize for best overall at the Annual SOLAR Cook Off in August 1994.

Saute in 3T oil:

2 cups diced red onion.

3 cups chopped green pepper

t bulb minded garlic

t medium chopped yellow squash

Add:

4 1/2 lbs canned tomato pure

2 1/2 lbs jar great northern beans

1 lb canned black beans

1/2 cup garlic vinegar

3 T Fresh Parsley - chopped

Cover and simmer 1 1/2 hours, stirring often.

Add:

1 lg can tomato paste

12 oz Clover Honey

1 tsp thyme. 1T chili powder 3T crushed basil 4 o∠ bacon bits

1 cup dry roasted unsalted peanuts 3T crushed oregano

Uncover and simmer 1 1/2 hours, stirring often. Add more tornato past as needed.

Add

2 cups Jack/Colby cheese, grated

1/2 cup ice Beer

3T black pepper.

1 cup unsalted cashews

2 curs chopped celery

1 bottle Ice Beer

2 T chili powder

1/2 bottle Ice Been

1T crushed red pepper

3 bay leaves

1 cup chopped red pepper

2 medium chopped zuccini

4 1/2 lbs canned kidney beans.

1 lb canned carbonzo beans

4-6 cans smoked rattlesnake meat, boned

Simmer uncovered 10 minutes, stiring VERY often.

To serve add grated cheddar cheese (mild to balance flavors) and/or not sauce to taste. Serves 20 to 40 people.
