

## Caving in Kentucky

Well, you asked for more caving and you got it. I just got word that the annual Carter Caves Crawl-a-thon is scheduled for January 24-26, 1997!

The plan is to drive down to Olive Hill, KY on Friday and stay at Carroll's Inn Motel. I have reserved five rooms under my name. The cost will be \$30 for 2 nights lodging. and will be first paid, first go I will be supplying the entry forms for the Craw-a-thon itself sometime in December. You can sign up for as many caving tours as you'd like on Saturday and/or Sunday. The cost is \$15 for two days of guided caying. and you will receive a free T-shirt. You must send this form to Carter Caves State Resort Park yourself, but don't delay as the trips do fill up quickly.

This is an annual event put on by the state park, and it is a great way for people to get acquainted with caving as they offer a wide variety of tours ranging from walking tours, a little bit of crawling, a lot of crawling, and vertical caving.

This trip could involve prolonged crawling through small, constricted passages, some of which may contain water. The rewards are a great physical challenge, and you will probably see tots of bats, cave crickets, and interesting formations. You must be in good physical condition to participate in level 3 or 4 caving tours.

Equipment you will need: old coveralls or any type of loose fitting clothing, knee and elbow pads, gloves, boots that cover the ankle, hard hat with chin strap (SOLAR can provide), three light sources with one that is mounted on your hard hat (duct tape works well) and extra batteries. If you need to borrow a SOLAR club helmet, I will have them at the January meeting. A \$25 refundable deposit is required.

## Cross Country Skiing I - The Diagonal Stride.

It was great to see so many SOLARites interested in a basic skills X-C ski class. We had 16 people sign up so far! With that kind of enthusiasm, how could we not have a class?

So the class will be for the beginning to intermediate level skier. These individuals will learn the true pleasure of cross country travel over snow with skis by way of the diagonal stride. This technique is the most fundamental for in-track as wellas out-of-track skiing and will lead to more advanced techniques such as the double pole and kick-double pole. Also covered are: how to select proper gear; how to hold your poles; how to recover from a fall; how to slow down and speed up on a down. hill run; and, how to turn on down hill. runs as well as on flats. Armed with these basic skills you will now enjoy endless hours of X-C skiing, in the cold chill of winter, and love every minute of it! Thank God for snow!

The class will be an on-snow clinic, with some handouts including a bibliography of great instructional books. The cost will be \$10.00 a person. It will take place at Maybury State Park for a half day providing good snow conditions, or if not, we will make it a whole day adventure by driving up to The Cross Country Ski Headquarters in North Higgins Lake area (near Roscommon).

Which brings us to When? Well, if we really want to enjoy the ski season fully with our new skills, we should have it early in the season. So, the

day is Saturday, January 11. Time will be 9:00 am at Maybury, or if up north, 11:00 am. Both touring centers rent skis if you don't own a pair yet. Call me if you have concerns about this. For those of you who didn't sign up and would like to, see me at this months meeting. Total space is limited to 20 skiers. You can also contact me at (810) 682-3955.

## How to Track a Leader without Getting Lost


