Michigan Winters Class Change!


Please note the following changes in class and practical dates for the Michigan Winters Class!

Review

Snowshoeing at Wilderness State Park

From the Journal of Jim Wright

I spent this past weekend snowshoeing at Wilderness State Park. I drove up Friday evening, leaving work about 4p.m. and arrived in Mackinaw City at 9:00p.m.

Once I reached Mackinaw City, I headed west out of town for the short drive to Wildemess State Park, The road was snow-packed but no problem, and the drive speciacular. When the road started following the Cecil Bay shoreline of Lake Michigan with the lake on the right and forest on the left I had to stop several times to enjoy the view of the frozen take with St. Ignace and the bridge in the distance. The light from my headlamps would reflect in thousands of sparkles from the ice on the foliage alongside the road. I would occasionally shut o'f the headlamps and drive by moonlight, it was so bright and so beautiful.

When I arrived at the cabin, it was cold cutside, but the wood burning stoves made it toasty inside. There were only five other SOLARites there when I arrived. Others kept trickling in until the last group arrived at 3a.m., long after I had gone to bed.

Sometime during the night John got out of his warm bed and strolled half the length of the cabin just to wake me up. Something to do with similarities between shoring and freight trains.

In the morning the cabin was crowded. There were people everywhere, women, men, making breakfast, cleaning up breakfast, dressing to go out. It wasn't quiet again until I get out of the cabin.

Matt and I tearned up to do some

snowshoeing. By the time we had snowshoed 300 yards I had to stop and take a clothing layer off. The sweat was running down my face like a waterfall. It is amazing how warm 10 degrees can be when you are working hard.

Because we were on snowshoes rather than skis Matt opted to do some serious bushwhacking, where skis can't go. So out through the swamps we went. The deer signs awesome. Deer trails were everywhere, some a foot wide and a toot deep in the snow, regular deer expressways. We found deer beds where we must have scared away the deer because the deer body impressions were still wet with melted snow.

At one point I broke through an ice layer and went in deep. I thought I heard water and had broken through ice into a pond. I was scared, especially when I could not get my feet back up through the holes I had made in the ice I called Matt and he approached with caution. I worked my feet up through the holes and after a few tries managed to climb out and back on top of the snow. There was no water. We think that what I broke through was a layer of ice which had formed on top of long grass which was hollow underneath.

We continued our bushwhacking, following the safety zone boundary around the day use area. It was tough going, the brush was thick, there were a lot of downed trees, and every once in awhile we would trip over our feet. Eventually we reached the steep bluff that runs parallel to Park Drive road. To get down to the road we had to walk along the bluff until we found a guily that cut through the bluff down to road level. We crossed the road and walked down to the Lake Michigan beach. It looked a lot like the surface of the moon. Apparently there had been a lot of ice packs piled up to form ridges and mounds, all under a smoothing layer

of snow now, but still indicative of natures forces. We hiked across the ice of Big Stone Bay to reach the Lakeshore. Campground beach which is across the road from the rustic cabins.

The cabin was empty when we returned after several hours of snowshoeing. We enjoyed the warnth and ate our lunches. After lunch Matt and I walked out into the campground area to see the quinzhee that Lester had built to sleep outdoors Saturday night. I decided that I liked the cabin more than I liked the quin-zhee, and I returned to the cabin to read a book and Matt set up his tent so that he could sleep outdoors tonight also.

The Saturday night pot-luck was it's usual SOLAR fling. There was my one pot sort-of stir-fry, three kinds of chili, snacks, cakes, wine, mulled cider with rum, beer, cheese and crackers, etc. Some of the group skied out to the end of Wagosnance Point by moonlight. I opted to read some more and then went to bed.

Sunday morning was a lot like Saturday. Another beautiful sunny, really cold day. A lot of people making breakfast, cleaning up, dressing for a last ski or snowshoe. I packed and left by 11a.m.

On the way home I detoured to Pigeon River State forest outside Vanderbilt to scout out the location for the Michigan Winters Class practical in February. The roads out that way were snow-packed, and I renewed by love affair with 4-wheel drive. The forest Headquarters was closed, but I now know where it is, and I had fun finding it.

It was a great weekend!

Trip Planning Seminar and Advanced Backpacking Class

You must have taken the backpacking class, or have similar experience: be able to participate in the planning meetings; and take the entire week off for the trip.
