Have You Heard the Latest?...BATS ARE COOL!

fter the October 7th General Membership
Meeting, Lori Nelson with the Organization for
Bar Conservation, will inform us of hundreds
of "bat facts." Lori will be doing a presentation on
Michigan bats. She will also answer questions such as:
How many species of bats are there?; How many still
live in Michigan?; How big is big?; How small is small?;



Are bass blind?: Do bats really carry rabies?: How many bugs do bats eat?: How can I attract bats to my backyard? The questions and answers go on and on...

Lori will also bring live, nonreleasable Michigan bars, along with meal worms, so that first hand foraging techniques of the bats can be observed. She will

also bring a bat detector so everyone can hear what echolocation sounds like. There will be an interactive session where we will discuss bat conservation rechniques and bat houses. I have been to one of these programs in the past and it is truly a great way to find out why buts are cook! See all you follow bat lovers there.

BAT FACTS PREVIEW

- Bats are flying mammals. Scientists have classified them into a unique order called "Chiroptera" which means "hand wing." Bats literally fly with their hands
- Bats have lived on the earth for over 50 million years, and today live on all continents except Antarctica.
- A single bat can eat up to 600 mosquitoes in one hour; that's 3,000 insects in one night.
- Bats will not attack people, they are very small and gentle inimals. Remember, we are very large to a bat and they are afraid of us.
- Bats are disappearing at alarming rates.
 Disturbance of roost sites due to development and vandalism are the greatest threats to the world's bats. Much of this is due to ignorance and misunderstanding.

SOLAR Sum thanks you for your questions. Here's what be came up for the September SOLAR Ray...

I'm new to the outdoor thing. What are some basic backcountry "rules" I should know before heading off into the wilds?

- Call the forest ranger for helpful hints before you nike.
 - Make sure your boots are properly broken in and waterproofed.
- Give an itinerary to a friend or family member.
- Avoid scented lotion and deodorants. You'll attract insects and bears.
- Pack a first aid kit and manual. Include items for treating blisters.
- Carry and drink plenty of water. Plan on at least 2 to 4 quarts per day per person. More for cold climates and high altitudes. For desert hiking, a gallon a day.
- Don't drink water directly out of a stream or lake.
 Boil first or use a water filter.
- If you're going to be hiking at high altitudes, acclimatize yourself for the first day or two.
- Wear an orange vest during hunting season.
- Warm, windy weather can produce fire hazards. Use a stove instead of campfires.
 - If thinking of bringing your dog, call ahead to see if he/she will be allowed on the trail.
- Pack a radio and extra batteries to stay in tune with weather information.
- Always carry a compass and map. For USGS topomaps, call 1-800-435-7627. For rush orders, call Map Express, 1-800-627-0039.
- Carry cut what you carry in. Stay on designated paths and tread lightly.

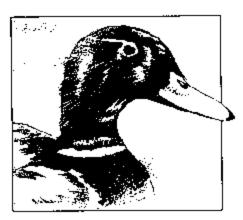

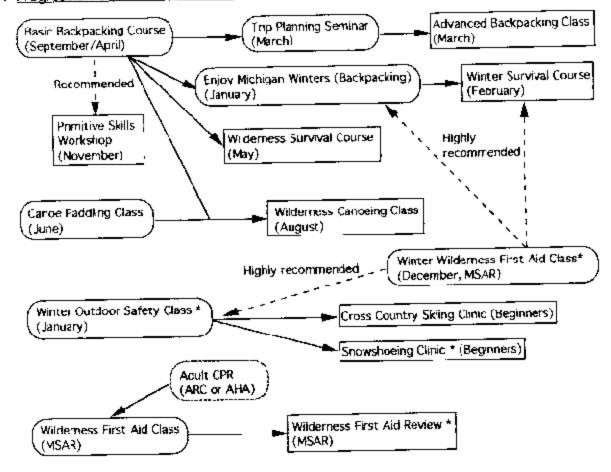

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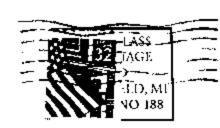
