The November program brings us Mr. Joe Rodgers' wonderful presentation on Birds of Prey. Mr. Rodgers is a member of the Wildlife Recovery Association. Through the help of volunteers and donations, the association cares for and rehabilitates injured and abandoned raptors. Mr. Rodgers spends the spring through the fall on back-country trips studying birds of prey, and the winter months educating people on these amazing creatures. In 1997, Wildlife Recovery cared for 35 raptors and 9 other species. A few of those were: Red-tailed Hawks, Cooper's Hawk, Great Horned Owl, Common Loon, Great Blue Heron, Marlin, Osprey, Eastern Screech Owl, and others

Plan to stay after the November meeting for a slide presentation, and learn more about the birds of prey. We will also get a chance to meet some of Mr. Rodgers' travelling companions... Live Raptors!

Enjoying Michigan Winters

Locking forward to winter in the Great Lake State is a popular thing to do. If you find yourself dreading the long nights and the too-cold days, perhaps you should look into *Enjoying Michigan Winters* class (EMWC). We will brighten your attitude!

Skiing, skating, sledding, snow-shoeing, photography, tracking, quiet solitude, ice-scapes, ice climbing, Northern Lights, dog sledding, fishing, and sharing hot cider around the campfire are only some of the reasons to get outside during the short days of the year.

Its quite easy to stay warm, dry, and comfortable, even in sub-zero weather. You just need to know how. EMWC is the class to get you out and having fun.

The class will cover: methods to keep warm, what and how to eat, how to change your metabolism, winter camping skills and equipment, personal locomotion for skiing and snow-shoeing, basic safety in winter, building your confidence in the outdoors, sled construction, and much more.

The class consists of five wednesday classes and two overnight practical exams. Optional, but recommended, will be the *Basic Cross-Country Skiing* class, and a *Sled Building* seminar. <u>Basic Backpacking is a prerequisite</u>.


