OCTOBER PROGRAM Walkin' Jim Stoltz

One of America's most unique folksingers and backcountry travelers, Walkin' Jim Stoltz, on tour from Big Sky, Montana, will bring his inspiring multimedia show, Forever Wild, to the SOLAR CLUB after the October general meeting. Walkin' Jim gets his name from the more than 23,000 miles he has walked the the wild country of North America. Carrying a guitar and writing songs along the way, his lyrics express a great love and respect for the

Earth and the wild places he knows so well. Known for his powerful baritone and emotion packed vocals, his Forever Wild show combines live music and poerry with multi-image slides. The result is a stirring celebration of wilderness. This year's tour marks Jim's 25th year of performing. He will be sharing images from the Utah wildlands, the Northern Rockies, the Pacific Coast Trail from Mexico to Yellowstone, the Yukon, and Canada. Walkin' Jim presented with the was Protection Environmental Outstanding Agency's Achievement Award for his sharing of nature and Wilderness across America. Edward Abbey, the late author of many nature classics, described Stoltz as "a



music man of exuberance and passion, with more to say in one song than Frank Sinatra ever managed in a whole bloody concert." This year Jim has released his sixth and seventh recordings, "The Web of Life" for kids, and "Oh, What a Life", a live album celebrating his 25th year of performing. Stoltz's recordings get regular airplay on National Public Radio, and will be on sale at the concert. Join us on Tuesday October 6th at the Colony Hall, located on Evergreen Road at 8-1/2 Mile Road, in Southfield. The regular SOLAR monthly meeting will start at 7:30PM, and will conclude with this wonderful event.

JORDAN RIVER PATHWAY

Join me, Karen Bates, and fellow SOLARites for a weekend hike and camp. We will meet at the Jordan River Trailhead on Saturday October 17th at 8:00am SHARP! We will take the 10 mile trail to camp on Saturday, and the 8 mile trail back to our ears on Sunday.

The campground is about 500 yards from a road, where we can spot a car for those of us that don't really want to carry a full backpack. The campground is a walk-in only camp, and parking on the road is very limited. I will be setting up camp on Friday the 16th in the evening. If anyone would like to join me Friday, or drop off their gear early Saturday before our 8AM meeting time, feel free.

There is a water pump and an outhouse in the campground (almost like Club Med!). There is no water available at the trailhead, so be sure to bring your own for the hike in.

The Jordan River Pathway is very hilly and very beautiful. The colors at this time of the year should be spectacular! Bring your cameras, remember the SOLAR Photo Contest is in January. The cost is \$10 for this event, which includes camping and Sunday breakfast.

NORDHOUSE DUNES CAR CAMP / DAY HIKE

Saturday - Sunday: November 7-8, 1998 This trip is always a favorite way to end the camping and hiking season (although many of us enjoy Michigan winters by camping out year 'round'). The rustic campsites at the Lake Michigan State Recreation Area are open for a fee of \$7.00 per site (2 vehicles per site). Thewater pump and pit toilets will be operating. You will have to carry in water and practice "leave no trace" ethics.

Be prepared for anything from Indian Summer to a post-El Niño winter! This trip is free except for the above mentioned camping fees. The SOLAR Steering Committee has before it, a proposed addition to the By-Laws of the club. Comments and concerns pertaining to this proposed section may be addressed to any of the Steering Committee, who are identified on page 8. A vote shall be taken at the October membership meeting.

PROPOSED ADDITION TO THE BY-LAWS:

Section 5.4.1. Termination of Membership

The Steering Committee may terminate the membership of any member participating in socially unacceptable or criminal behavior on any S.O.I. A.R. sponsored class or activity. The member shall be notified in writing by Certified Mail, Return Receipt Requested, that the Steering Committee is considering the termination of their membership. The member under consideration for termination, shall be advised of the time and location of the Steering Committee meeting where the termination will be considered. The member under consideration for termination shall have the right to select a Member At Large of the club to chair the termination proceedings. The Steering Committee shall advise the member why termination is being considered, presenting such supporting materials or witnesses as required. The member under consideration, shall have the right to bring such supporting materials and witnesses to demonstrate why the termination clause should not be involked. The termination of a membership shall require unanimous vote of the Steering Committee. If a membership is terminated, donations to the club shall be prorated (Lifetime Memberships shall be amortized over five years) and any unused portions of the donation shall be returned.

Feather Bowling

Never heard of Feather Bowling? Actually this is a game played in Belgium. It's a cross between bowling, marbles, horseshoes, and becci ball.

The lanes are dirt, formed similar to a trough. At the end there is a feather sticking up in the center of the lane.

The object of the game is to be the closest to the feather with your wheel. The wheel (akin to a bowling ball) is similar in appearance to a small cheese wheel.

You roll the wheel down the lane and it wobbles and traverses from side to side. When it gets to the far end, you hope it falls over next to (or on) the feather. As more and more wheels are played, the lane becomes an obstacle course. Many skillful players are able to weave their shot between the wheels previously played.

Currently the games are full, but you may be able to switch off with another person to give it a try, or there may some cancellations.

Feather Bowling will be from 8:00PM'till 10:00PM. If you would like to meet for dinner, that is at 6:00PM.

The Cadieux Cafe offers a broad menu of chilisalads, and sandwiches, up to full dinners. They are world famous for their mussels, and I mean WORLD FAMOUS, literally! I have heard of people from Europe making a stop in Detroit specifically to get a taste of them! Also, this is the only place in the United States where you can play this game, and there's only one other place in North America, in Ontario.

There are tables between the lanes for observers, which can be as fun as actually playing the game.
