Yes, underground—in a good sense of course. Join me, Karen Bates, for a trip to Mammoth Cave National Park in Kentucky. We will be going on a wild tour of Mammoth Cave. This is not the "foo foo" walkthrough with paved sidewalks and electricity...No, no, no! We will have the fun of getting mee and dirty in the dark on a challenging crawl. The following is from the park ranger:

: 6 to 6 1/2 hours, 5 1/2 miles, extremely strenuous. Must be 16 years or older--if there is doubt you will have to have proof of age. Must have a chest size no larger than 42 inches--if there is doubt you will be measured. Larger people will not fit through the tight spaces. Crewl, climb and squreze through small passages off the traditional tour routes. Helmets and lights provided. Knee pads are available out you may want to bring your town. No rollerblade or hard type knee pads allowed. Light- op over the aukle lace up boots, with lug to deeply treated soles are required. Gloves and long pants recommended. Visitors may wish to bring a lunch and water bottle in a "small fanny pack". Visitors should consider their physical limitations realistically. This is not a trip recommended for visitors who fear heights or close places or who cannot climb steps.

OK...with all that said, this trip will be great fun. I saw over 40 Solarites at the last crawlathon having fun. Let's do it again! This trip is October 15-17, 1999, limit is 14 people max (first paid, first go). The cost is \$90.00 per person. Included in the trip is two nights lodging inside the park and the guided cave tour. If you would like to make a long weekend out of this trip there are plenty of other things to do in the park, including walking, historychack tiding, randoling and boating. #### Letters from the Road: The Trek North

This 58-day motorcycle tour of Canada and Alaska has been in the planning stages for a long time. My new Honda Shadow is the 17<sup>th</sup> and latest acquisition that has fed my lifelong fascination with two wheels and speed.

I had laid out a specific course that would have taken the to Colorado, where, pivoting north, I would ride the spine of the Rockies all the way to Alaska. However, I had to perform a series of high speed interstate fights to avoid persecution at the hands of Mother Nature. I experienced thunderstorms and severe lateral winds in Michigan and Indiana, forcing me off the road for a day. Turning north, I sought shelter from the storms and visited an old SOLAR friend, Tim Stangl. A short break in the storms allowed me to continue on my way. My journey was soon blocked by another series of storms which flooded roads in Wisconsin; I was forced to detour again. Finally, a break in the weather and the welcome sight of clear blue skies allowed me to make up for lost time. Flying across the high plains, again my ride was shifted abruptly north by a storm front that brought tornadoes and golf ball-sized hail to South Dakota, Colorado, and Wyoming.

The plus side of these detours was that I got off the interstates and discovered quaint little towns like Moonsocket, North Dakota, Whocoup, and my favorite, Sunshine, Montana.

Shaking free at last from the storms, the ride across North Dakota and Montana was fast. One of my favorite sections was the road between Uclena and Great Falls, Montana, a biker's dream with curvy mountain roads and smooth pavement.



I reached Banff. Alberta, on the evening of June 16th. Cathy Dolland and I had arranged to cross paths for several days of rest and recreation in the Canadian Rockies. We spent 3 days camping and day-hiking in the splendors of Banff, Lake Louise, and Jasper National Parks. The weather was perfect as we enjoyed a picnic on top of Sulfur Mountain. Cathy returned home on the 20th, and I resumed my northward migration.

It took me several long days in the saddle to reach Dawson Creek, where the 1500 mile long Alaskan Canadian (Alean) highway begins. The Alean passes through topography that varies from snow-capped mountains to bog-like tundra. The majority of the highway is paved, with services few and fat between.

My final night in the Yukon was spent in Dawson City, famed as the hub of the Klondike gold rush. Leaving the history of Dawson behind, I headed toward the U.S. border, and enjoyed the scenery on the "top of the world highway."
