9th annual fossil hunt

July 24-25, 1999, or make it a one-day trip on July 25.

The annual fossil hunt is a kid-friendly trip to Arkona, Canada, which is an approximately 2 1/2 hour drive from Detroit going over the Port Huron Bridge. Just north of the town of Arkona is the Rock Glen Conservation Area where the hunt will take place.

This is a non-SOLAR event so you can invite your non-SOLAR friends. Last year 22 adults and 25 kids enjoyed the hunt for the fossils and the enjoyment of the water.

So why collect fossils? Most people collect for the simple fun of it - for the fun of tramping and exploring, for the excitement of a rare find. Here is an opportunity to spend a day or two with your friends as well as bring home a piece (or a few pieces) of PREHISTORY.

On Saturday, July 24, Jim will lead a visit to the waterfalls in the Godrich area for those who are camping nearby or motelling.

The Fossil Hunt will be on July 25. Although you don't HAVE to get wet, be forewarned to wear clothing that CAN get wet. Lunch will be the famous SOLAR potluck so bring your favorites to share. The cost is free, except for park entry fees and your food.



GRAND CAMPING WEEKEND

All Solarites invited on August 6-8.1999!

It's the annual August Rattlesnake weekend at Rattlesnake Point in Milton, Ontario. On this weekend, everyone camps on a grassy hillside with access to outhouses, hot showers, and even flush toilets. SOLAR tradition includes the buffalo shuffle (an early morning hike on Saturday to see REAL buffalo), a bicycle race, and the competitive COOK-OFF, in which all food preparation must occur on the premises. Unusual and creative gastronomic concoctions are certainly welcome. Although you may choose not to enter the contest, all campers bring a dish to pass for a potluck feast.

On Saturday, the 7th, we will drive to Crawford Lake Conservation Area, a short drive away. Crawford Lake is a basin atop the Niagara Escarpment, the most significant landform in southern Ontario. Here you will see limestone cliffs, woodlands, wetlands, and the lake, an ecologically unusual formation itself. Studies of the sediment, which can be accurately dated back 1000. years, led to the discovery of one of the most accurately dated Iroquolan villages in Canada. A reconstructed fifteenth century village is located at this site. Here we will visit Wolf Clan's Longhouse. Learning Center.

Another trip we will take is to the Spencer Gorge. Wilderness Area. This Y-shaped gorge is fed by two creeks, Spencer and Logie's, each of which plunges over the Escarpment in a waterfall. We'll bike along the Bruce Trail, perhaps stopping at the Kelso Conservation Area for a swim and then head back to camp to begin cooking

On the way home Sunday, we will visit the African Lion Safari nea: Cambridge, Ontario and see the lions, tigers, monkeys, plains animals, and water animal habitats. For an extra \$5 you can even ride on an elephant! It's a whole lot of fun and a nice ending to our camping weekend.

DESTINATION NIAGARA FALLS



Join us for a jaunt to Niagara Falls June 18-20! There's so much to do. Start the weekend on Friday with a free fireworks display over the falls at 10:00 p.m. On Saturday we will Journey Behind The Falls wearing biodegradable raincoats and explore the tunnels on a self-guided tour, seeing the underside of the falls, and come out on the observation deck to view the falls (and the spray) up close. Afterwards, we will hike, drive, or walk to other areas, including the world's largest glass enclosed conservatory. Niagara Gler. Nature Area, which is a great place to learn more about the geology of the area, and Clifton Hill.

After a full day of sightseeing and dinner, we will swim in the outdoor or olympic indoor pools, and bath in the hot tubs and sauna, eat marshmallows, and relax our bones further around a campfite.

On Sunday, we can visit other waterfalls along the Niagara Escarpment and off the Bruce Trail, including the lesser known but incredible three falls at the Rockway Conservation Area and the Balls Falls area.

Lodging arrangements include camping at the local KOA campground (\$28 for two persons per might or \$8 for groups of 20 or more) and cabins (\$50 per night for two or \$60 for four people). All prices listed are Canadian dollars—the exchange rate is about 40%). All arrangements are up to the individual (lodging, events, food). The SOLAR fee is FREE! WILDFLOWER WALK AT INDIAN SPRINGS METROPARK

On one bright and clear Sunday in late April, several SOLAR members met at the Indian Springs Metropark in Oakland County for a wildflower identification outing. The weather was mild, and so the day was perfect for this kind of activity.

We loitered and gabbed with each other outside the nature center as SOLAR-souls trickled in for our hike. Margaret was very patient and waited for over a half-hour before we started out. As it was, the latecomers found us anyway.

Among the plants we saw:

- The county's biggest bumper crop of Skunk Cabbage. Fortunately, it hadn't begun to blossom, thus saving our olfactory receptors (and us) from a stinky situation.
- A multitude of Mayapples. When they are sprouting they look like a forest of umbtellas for cives popping
 up out of the ground.
- Hepatica—Medical people in the club might wonder why a flowering plant is named after an organ meat
 that is often served with onions. Look at the leaves for a clue...And you still might wonder who thought
 they were liver-shaped.
- Trout lifes—What comes to my mind are flowers that look rather fishy. Actually, it's the leaves of this plant
 that have the mottled look of that famous Michigan fish.
- Pitcher plants Like the Venus Flytrap and the Sundew, it relies on insects to provide part of its nutrition.
 It never fails to amuse me how a plant might not be a vegetarian.

We saw much more, and some plants we couldn't identify. Some because they weren't plants, like Damien's Morel, and others because they were retorants from last year's growth. Maybe next year we'll get it figured out.

We also saw and heard birds. I won't mention more than a few: Chickadees, Nuthatches, Goldfinches, Redbellied Woodpeckers, and Eastern Meadowlarks. There were enough other tree-top feathered flitterers to give me a stiff neck.

We finished up over at Doug's for a potleck in nearby Holly. The food was tasty, the company quite agreeable, and our day an overwhelmingly enjoyable experience.
