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# Letters from the Road: Part II

Alaska: Glanes, Frains and Automobiles

Crossing the border into Alaska I had no idea that my first day back on American soil was going to be so memorable. The Taylor highway, which starts at the U.S. border, is a disaster waiting to happen. Imagine an Algoriquin portage with highway markers. For those of you who haven't experienced Algoriquin, this means **boulders** in the roadway.

Shortly after crossing the border I saw an ancient R.V. directly in front of the drive over a particularly rough spot in the road. All of a sudden, pieces of its undercarriage were ripped from their mounts. I then watched, disbelieving, as the driver lost control and plunged over the cliff. The sight of an airborne R.V. is a sight I will never forget. I stopped amidst the road debris, grabbed my first aid kit and headed toward the edge. Stopping briefly to survey the carnage, I saw that the R.V. had come to an abrupt stop, impaled on a tree, approximately 150 feet down the slope. As I headed over the edge, I mentally ran through the inventory of my kit. I recall praying that I would remember enough from my first aid classes to be of some value. I expected to see the decimated remains of a family. Halfway down the cliff I encountered the driver of the R.V. climbing up the hill. He appeared dazed, but he said that he was alone and unburt. I continued down to the wreckage to double-check. Thank God he was alone and without even a scratch. Two guys in a jeep, who had been behind me, took this guy to the nearest town.

I followed them to the "town" of Boundry, Alaska, stopping at the solo log cabin which constitutes the entire town. The proprietor shared with me his theory of how the U.S. government is planting nuclear devices under both polar icecaps and all the world's glaciers. According to him, the government is going to melt all the ice in the world, killing two-thirds of the population. He felt safe and secure in his mountain tip hideaway, pointing to his marked map and noting his altitude. Shades of the Twilight Zone. I had been in Alaska one whole hout. What else would I encounter in the months ahead?

It then took me five hours to cover the all of 75 miles of this treacherous road. I cursed the Taylor highway as a butt-slapping, kidney-vibrating, motorcycle-destroying, never-to-be-repeated experience.

The next two weeks were mild in comparison. I spent four days camped near Denali National Park. I had to wait several days for my backcountry pass. Incredibly, all four days were extremely clear, and Denali was completely visible. The ranger said she couldn't recall any other time that it had been clear for such a long period. During this time, my metallic partner and I took advantage of the wait and abused some Alaskan asphalt.

Margaret Martin joined me on July 10th. I parked the bike for ten days while Margaret and I explored some of the more picturesque parts of the state. We traveled by ear, train, boat, airplane and horseback in pursuit of the perfect photo opportunity.

Seven SOLAR backpackers experienced a unique weekend, July 31-August 2, at Nordhouse Dunes. For those who have yet to discover this beautiful wilderness area in the Huron Manistee Forest, it can be found roughly 8 miles north of Ludington and 12 miles southwest of Manistee. The 3,450 acres of desert-like grassy dunes bordered by stands of pine and hardwood forest is the only designated wilderness in the Lower Peninsula.

We met in the south parking lot and hiked through a dreamy wooded landscape to the beach after midnight, enveloped in a warm humid breeze. Reaching the shores of Lake Michigan, we were treated to a spectacular show of heat lightning and crashing waves. After a brief discussion to form a safety plan for a possible storm, we comfortably settled to sleep on the beach. Shortly thereafter, we were abruptly awakened by high winds and the swift approach of immense black clouds moving across the water. Scrambling over the dunes to safe cover in the tree line, the group braved the elements for the remainder of the night, with or without tents. The next morning, gray clouds gave way to clear sun as we set up camp and bodysurfed in the warm coastal waters of Lake Michigan. 
