


This month's program is hosted by Tom Olaffo, and Rob Mair.







THIS TRIP TO NORDHOUSE DUNES WILDERNESS HAS BEEN A TRADITION WITH SOLAR FOR ABOUT 7 YEARS NOW. WE CONSIDER THIS THE LAST OPPORTUNITY TO GO BACEPACEING IN MICHIGAN FOR THE YEAR, BECAUSE IT'S THE LAST WEEREND BEFORE FIREARM DEER SEASON, AND AND HUNTERS OUTNUMBER EVERYTHING IN THE VOODS. THE NORDHOUSE DUNES WILDERNESS AREA IS A VERY UNIQUE ECOSYSTEN THAT NOT ONLY HAS DUNES, BUT ALSO IS MIXED WITH JUNIPER, JACK PINE, HENLOCK, A RIVER, MARSHES, AND A LAKE. SOME OF THE DUNES STAND ABOUT 140 FR. ABOVE LAKE MICHIGAN, AND ARE OVER 3500 YRS. OLD. THERE IS A CAR CAMPING AREA JUST NORTH OF THE WILDERNESS AREA CALLED LAKE MICHIGAN RECREATION AREA, THAT HAS TRAILS LEADING INTO NORDHOUSE DUNES. TYPICALLY, MOST PEOPLE CAR CAMP, AND A SMALL GROUP WILL BACKPACK. MOST LIRELY PATHS WILL CROSS SOMETIME DURING THE WEEKEND. NO HEED TO SIGN UP FOR THIS TRIP. ## Enjoy Michigan Winters BACKPACKING

Winter backpacking skill is not just for winters, it is also a useful back-up for the unexpected cold days in early spring and late fall.

This course will teach you the "ins-and-outs" of cold weather backpacking. We'll teach you how to stay warm, how to keep your energy level up when skiing, or snow shoeing. We'll also teach you how to build a snow shelter, just in case something does go horribly wrong on that easy "5-hour ski trip".

You can also use these skills while camping glaciers, or snowy peaks at the Rockies.

The first class will be on December 13th, and the remaining classes held on all five Wednesdays in January (2001). The practicals will be on the weekends of Jan. 20th, and Feb. 3, 2001. The cost is \$75.00. All indoor classes will be held at Benchmark in Farmington.

The course is open to the graduates of the Backpacking Course. The course is the prerequisite for the Winter Survival class, usually held in February. Although a first Aid certification is not required, it is recommended for outings.
