# SOLAR checks out the benefits of curling

FROZEN FOUNTAIN OF YOUTH — Detroiters practice secret skills in Ferndale that appear to make them younger. Medical evidence aside, people who ourl obviously have found a way to appear younger than they are. Ask Mr. Jack Clark who, at age 92, appears younger than Ernie Harwell, and can still ourl well. "I've been curling for 50 years and can still skip and win games. I don't see stopping soon."

Dr. Zigmond Zryd of the McGill University medical faculty says that modern research proves that spending lots o time in cold environments and exercising aerobically delays the onset of wrinkles and graying hair. "It is possible that the genial atmosphere of curling games and the positive attitudes of curlers may significantly decrease the risk of heart disease and brain degeneration among men and women between the ages of 30 and 60." Dr. Zryd has just received a grant from government in Ottawa to do a related study of the long-term effects of curling on men's petency.

I visited with members at the new club in Ferndale to discuss the healthy effects of curling. "Our new building will be open by the end of the month," says Don Beaulieu, Club President. "As soon as possible, we will make the ice and start league curling on weeknights." He admits curling is rigorous, and he expects to suffer sore muscles for at least 2 days after his first game of the season. "Regular exercise of any other sort does not prepare curlers for the stretch and balance of the slide delivery. And the effort of sweeping in front of heavy, granite rocks can wear you out."

Club instructor Hugh Schmidt says that anyone can learn to curl, "Curling is a brain game and team communication is one of the essentials. You dress light as if you were ski racing because you burn so many calories. Canoers do well because they already have strong shoulders. Rock climbers [usually] do OK because their agility and balance help them stretch and slide on slick ice more easily. About any vigorous activity will help. Even cavers benefit because it helps bring them out of their shells. Good slide deliveries are smooth and fluid and graceful; sweeping is just exhausting." He adds that the game can be played at many levels, from casual, social fun to the incredible perfection of Olympic teams.

### Letters from the Road - Alaska & the Northwest Territories

Every summer for years, SOLAR member and teacher Tom Dunn rode his motorcycle to Alaska and back. In this final excerpt, he shares the rest of his road adventures.

One of the wonderful things about letting the whims of the road determine my travels are the people I meet. I just never know what to expect. I met Craig, a fellow teacher and biker, in a campground in British Columbia. We were both booked on the same carferry to Skagway, Alaska. Unlike my modus operandi he had an agenda to his travels. Craig had a list of women he had met via the Internet and had scheduled a full calendar of dates. He met one of these women, Pat, in Juneau where we had an hour layover. After a 2-day voyage we arrived at Skagway-Craig to meet other women, me to continue my journey. I made good time in the distance between 🖑 Anchorage and Skagway.

I was looking forward to meeting up with some friends from my last trip to Alaska. I spent several days on the Kenai Peninsula with them and then headed north. It is a beautiful several hour ride from Anchorage to Denali National Park. It was my third time to the park and I quickly sought out my favorite campground. I had the disgusting chore of pitching my tent in a storm of freezing rain and snow. It is a heartbreaking thing to be snug in my tent and sleeping bag and look out to see my motorcycle covered with snow.

I felt sorry for the group of backpackers camped near me. They were from Louisiana and were not used to cold weather. Two of their groups of five were lost in the backcountry of Denali. I camped there for several days and then headed on, with meighbors and the rangers organizing a search and rescue mission.

I only spent 10 days in Alaska before heading east. I was determined to be in Boston for Cathy Dolland's wedding approximately 6,000 miles away. I wanted to give myself plenty of time for the run across North America. Shortly after leavin Anchorage I met another biker, Jim Miller out of Florida. He is a retired fireman who was fulfilling a lifelong dream, a ride t Alaska. This was to be his last ride as he is dying from emphysema. We rode together for several days. What conversations whad!

The Alaska Highway is always under repair somewhere. The major projects this year were in the Yukon Territory. The wors ran approximately 20 miles. The road was gone and we had to ride on the dirt detour. The project was so dusty that they woul only let one direction of traffic on the detour at a time. Each convoy had a guide vehicle. I was immediately behind the guide an could not see his truck, the flashing lights or the road. I was able to steer by positioning my bike about 6 feet from the side of the road and kept that orientation for 20 miles. It took about an hour and a half to make it through that specific project. Me. Jim, an our bikes were completely caked with chalky dust. After several days Jim and I went our separate ways. I turned north to visit the Northwest Territories, bound for Yellowknife. The road north to Yellowknife was 1,000 miles long, most of it gravel and dirt. had enough dust and turned around after only a day. The remainder of the trip was uneventful. I did take a day layover i Winnipeg. The tires on my bike were completely worn out.

One final note, Craig is now engaged to Pat and she has moved to Montana. Life is an adventure!!!!!
