





#### 2001 SUBURU NORTH AMERICAN VASA SKI TRIP

AH! Time again for the VASA. This is a fun and challenging event. If you have never done the VASA before, let me describe the experience. The VASA is a timed race. Each participant is given a number and a starting position. The faster established skiers are given an earlier starting position. When the word is given, every skier in your starting group sets off in a mad rush. If you survive this period, you will be well on your way to fame and fortune.

The trail first winds its way up hill through beautiful forestry. After a short while, when you're just getting used to the exercise, you hit the "WALL". A rather large hill with hundreds of skiers crawling upon its rather

steep face. Seriously, this is the largest hill on the course, and it really is not that steep.

After the "WALL" you will encounter the free style skiers. These maniacs will pass you like you're standing still, and have the rather annoying habit of discarding water bottles in the middle of the trail. REMEMBER, the 50K skiers will pass you again later.

About every 5K you will pass rest stops that provide bananas, cookies, water and sports drinks. It is highly suggested that you stop, refuel, and drink late of liquids. It is also important to bring power bars or other energy substitutes to recharge yourself when needed.

The 27K trail is a fun, intermediate course with small ups and downs and curves. There are some open

areas, but most of the trail is wooded. The 50K skiers do the 27K trail twice.

At the start of the race, you will be provided with a bag to leave your coat and personal items in. At the finish line, you will find your personal items in a warming tent. Cookies and other refreshments will be available.

This years VASA ski event will occur February 9th. 10th and 11th. On Friday the 9th. I will check in at the Days Inn in Traverse City around 5:00pm. Dinner will be at a local restaurant of your choice. Breakfasts are free at the motel restaurant.

The VASA race is on Saturday, February 10th, between 8:30am and 9:45am. Saturday evening we usually order pizza and socialize in our rooms. Saturday night is the awards ceremony. We usually make an appearance, pick up awards, and check the published race results.

Sadly, Sunday brings about our time to return to civilization. But before you leave try skiing the 27K North Peak Grand Traverse Classic, or join me at Fourbush Corners for some additional skiing.


