



Archaeology Digs June 16-17, July 21-22


Only a couple Solarites have experienced an archaeological dig, but that's about to change. This summer, SOLAR is going to a nearby school to learn about the fascinating world of archaeological field work. The two-day school is an excellent introduction for enthusiastic amateurs to learn to do field and lab work and find out about volunteer opportunities. It's like going to college and majoring in archaeology, without all the fuss.

Our scientific curiosities will take us to the Crawford Lake area in southern Ontario. The Rife Site was a network of Iroquois villages occupied about 550 years ago right before European contact. The archaeologists have recreated one of these villages complete with long houses. Many beautiful things have been found there, such as intricate combs carved of elk antlers and arrowheads, knives, pots, and tools. Two years ago, a volunteer found a 4,000-year-old bone needle for lacing snowshoes (the Iroquois who found it must have dug it up and kept it as an ancient curiosity!)

The Rife Site is near Campbeliville, Ontario on the Bruce Trail. We'll camp at Raitlesnake Park, where many of us have been rock climbing. The cost is adults - \$160 (including 2 functies and Saturday BBQ) plus camping, and children over 8 are welcome for \$110. We will arrive Friday night and leave Sunday at 5.

SOLAR's response has been great, but overwhelming; the archaeologist has had second thoughts and limited signups to 15 people per weekend. Thus as of mid-May there are 5 spots left on the June trip and 1 spot left on the July trip. For more information email Laura4991@prodigy.net or call home (810) 446-1123. June's Featured Speaker

Dr. William Finlayson, an archaeologist at the London (Ontario) Museum of Archaeology for 27 years, will join us at our June Solar meeting. He will be our teacher for this summer's two field schools. He has devoted his studies to the excavation and study of Iroquois sites in Ontario. He wrote a book chronicling his work in the area titled "Iroquoian Peoples of the Land of Rocks and Water, A.D. 1000-1650: A Study in Settlement Archaeology," for sale on amazon.com. Dr. Finlayson is Lawson Professor of Canadian Archaeology at The University of Western Ontario and former Director-General of the London Museum of Archaeology, a University affiliate. While focusing his research on the Crawford Lake area, he also directed 2 of the largest salvage/rescue archaeological projects in southern Ontario. He has also worked extensively on the application of computer techniques to archaeology.

Dr. Finlayson's talk will be entitled "The Crawford Lake Story: Digging into Ontario Archaeology". This will review his 32-year study of the occupation of the Crawford Lake area by Iroquoian peoples from A.D. 1000 - 1650, with highlights of past excavations at the Metate site, an early historic Neutral village occupied about A.D. 1550 which will be the location of the field schools in June and July.

Field Trip to Fossil Hunt July 22

This is a trip I began doing when I was new to SOLAR and it has really caught on. This is its 11th year. Each year it becomes bigger and better, if that's possible. It has evolved into a good family outing and a good trip to bring friends and neighbors on, so they do not need to be SOLAR members to go. Last year over 24 adults and over 28 kids went. "If you do not like kids, do not go on this trip." The kids run all over the place (and have a great time). But if you do not have kids come anyhow. Us adults also have a blast.


What do we do? We look around their museum, hike on nature trails, see butterflies, take pictures, look for and find tons of fossils (please limit what you take home to just a few). We eat a big fund; (porticek style), take a dip under a \$5-foot waterfall, hike the mark, swim and generally play, laugh and relax.

What to bring: happy attitude, pot luck lunch, your own drinks, swim suit, shoes that can get wet (sandals or old tennis shoes work best—hiking boots not needed), a waterproof camera, sun gook, playful spirit, towel, clothes to change into for your ride home.

This trip goes rain or shine! The weather is often very different there than it is in Detroit.

Directions from Detroit: Go to Port Huron (do not cross into Canada at Windsor). Take Highway 402 east to exit 44 and go left/north. You are now on 7/79. The road goes north then makes a sharp turn to the right/east then another sharp turn toward the town of Arkona. Just beyond the town turn right to Rock Glan Conservation Area. We will meet at their museum at 11 a.m. It's about a 2.5-hour drive from the Detroit area.

- 3. Clicking the "Remember my..." checkbox during login will log you in automatically when you visit the page after that. Click logout on the top to turn "Remember my..." off.



Solar Journey to the first National Park - *Yellowstone*

This summer, you have the opportunity to spend 2 weeks in Yellowstone National Park. [I introduced this trip to the Club at the May meeting.] The SOLAR group will leave on 25 August and return on or before 9 September, a period that spans Labor Day. Yellowstone is wilderness offering vast, beautifut landscapes and dramatic geysers. It is a fine place to see every major mammal species that has inhabited the northern mountains and high plains, including elk, antelope, bighorn sheep, mountain goat, wolf, and bear.

The goal of the trip is to take and camp in the backcountry and explore the Park's many different biomes. Most trails charge elevation gradually, and climbs are short. Between hikes, we will tour the tourist sites including the geyser basins. Park campgrounds offer shopping and cleaning, so the hikers can resupply without even leaving the Park

The Park is mostly rolling, high country, a plateau that once was a volcanic caldera. The plateau has elevations from 7500-8500 feet with mountain peaks from 10,000 to 11,000 feet. Rivers and lakes, forests and grasslands provide great variety for hikers. Geysers and waterfalls are frequent in the backcountry, seldom visited by anyone but the occasional hiker. At this time of year, bugs are not a problem and the weather is normally dry and cool. The tourist hoards are gone.

Most people thinking of Yellowstone have visions of geysers and grizzlies, both powerful and rare. There are a few dangers here, as in backcountry anywhere. We shall prepare for camping in bear country by learning how to set up a safe camp, and generally will be hiking in groups of 4 or more. The groups can use adjacent campsites along the trails

So far, 12 people are committed to go, most flying to Montana. We intend to have our second meeting in early lune to discuss gear and food and trails to use. There is no limit to how many may join us, and the deadline to sign up is I August. I am not collecting money. Decide soon and ouy cheaper tickets, but try to coincide your travel with others so it is easier to get to and from the Park Airline and rail tickets both cost around \$400. We can share the costs of rental cars.

For more information, see me at the next SOLAR meetings. I have handouts to give you and will be happy to answer your questions.

WANTED: GEAR TESTERS - NO EXPERIENCE REQUIRED

A tunny thing happened on the fight from Amsterdam to Detroit in March. Gene and Leslie Cordova and Maria Edwards just happened to be sitting near Gianpietro Beltramello, the President of Gabel Group, an Italian trekking pole manufacturer. We began a simple conversation, eventually mentioning the SOLAR club. Well, to come right to the point, Mr. Beltramello has shipped numerous pairs of very nice looking, higher end trekking poles that he would like our club to demo. The only catch is that he wants feedback on the poles, so if you agree to be a gear tester, you will also be expected to fill out a brief questionnaire.

According to Mr. Beltramello: "Try to have them used by all kinds of people, all ages and all skills. Some of the features include: A.I.C.S. (Anti-Impact-Cushion-System), which is a urethane-foam-spring that absorbs vibration, specially dedicated for long use of the poles during the day. Another interesting and exclusive item is the FLS (Fit-Link-System). This is a 3D strap, which should improve performance during use." These trekking poles are available in the United States and are sold by Suunto USA.

So, are you planning a backpack or litking trip in Michigan this summer? How about out west, or are you lucky enough to go out of the country this year? Take a set of trekking poles with you.

Doug did point out that there were Pink Ladies Slippers along the trail, which I did see and are one of my favorite wildflowers. The woods were rampant with wild geranium also. The trail is fun to ride as it winds through the cool woods and over a series of wooden bridges.

After everyone had their fill of their chosen activity on Saturday, we had the traditional potluck. Once again I was amazed at what can be conjured up on a camp cook stove.
