



SOUTH MANITOU ISLAND BACKPACK Memorial Weekend Kid Friendly

Just finishing the spring backpack class, and looking to practice your new found skills, or just want to get out after the winter? Come join SOLAR as we backpack South Manitou Island. You must have taken the SOLAR backpack dass of be proficient at backpacking to participate in this event.

You may choose to take the ferry over to the Island either Friday or Saturday, and everybody will be returning on the Monday Ferry. Please let me

know when you sign up so that I can make the appropriate reservations. The cost of this trip is \$27 which includes your camping fees and the ferry, \$18 for kids 12 and younger. You will be responsible to pay the park (either on the mainland or on the Island) a \$7 vehicle fee, plus there is a \$1 per day parking fee.

NOTE: These fees are 2000 rates and are subject to change.

South Manitou Island is part of Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore. We will be hiking about 1.5 miles to the Bay Campground where I have 2 group campsites reserved for SOLAR. These sites are equipped with a fire ring, outhouse and water pump, but no picnic tables. You should be prepared to carry all of your gear in, as they do not allow any kind of wheeled device. Be advised that there is NO food service on the Island or any place to purchase supplies. Also, be prepared to

hang your food from the killer CHIPMUNKS!! A backpack stove is also a necessity, as well as a rain tarp in case it does rain (this is Michigan), SOLAR has some that you may borrow. Please try to double up in your tents as each site will only accommodate 10 tents and up to 20 people.

Tagge are a lot of interesting day hikes available on the Island. You can tour the 1871 highthouse, wanter around the old farmsteads, orchards and connetely, visit the old growth cedars, view the shipwreck of the Francisco Morazan which run agreemed in 1960, climb on the sand dunes, or just play at the beach.

There is a variety of wildlife on the island, including fox, beaver, coyote, squirrel, chipmunk, snowahoe hare, deer mouse and four species of bats

At the May meeting I will have a list of people who are going on both the Friday and Saturday ferry. Please take a copy and try to car peoples much as possible.

Remember that you will be responsible for your own food and gear (stoves, water falters, teats, first aid, bear bag etc.) PLEASE COME PREPARED!!!
