WILDERNESS PARK HIKING & MACKINAC ISLAND BIKING - Sept. 14 - 16

KID FRIENDLY, NO PETS – Come join S.O.L.A.R. as we bike Mackinac Island and hike Wilderness State Park on September 14 - 16, 2001. This is going to be a loosely organized trip. There are a lot of things to do in the area. The main plan is (weather depending) to go to Mackinac Island (11 miles from park to the ferry) on Saturday and do some bike riding, visit the forts, eat some fudge, eat some ice cream, take a carriage ride or visit the butterfly house.

You can rent bikes on the Island, but it is cheaper to bring your own. The ferry to Mackinac Island leaves every half hour and costs \$15.50 round trip for adults, \$7.50 for children 5 - 11, and \$6.50 for bikes. On Sunday, you can hike Wilderness State Park which has 16 miles of hiking trails, and 26 miles of Lake Michigan shoreline, or you can take a trip to Tahquamenon Falls. We will be staying in bunkhouses #2 and #3.

These area rustic bunkhouses (i.e. no electric) with mattresses provided, outhouses nearby, and this time of year the showers and flush toilets should be available. Bring a sleeping bag or sheets. Also, please bring a lantern, campstove, games, stories, and a sense of humor. Everyone is expected to help clean up the cabin on Sunday before we leave!!! All this fun can be yours for a mere \$15 per person, plus the cost of the Mackinac Island ferry. SUPER SOLAR ADVENTURE WEEKEND ... THINK NEXT YEAR

Now that summer is almost over its time to think about next year. Once again I am planning a <u>SOLAR Rafting trip on the New River</u> for the **Nemorial Day Weekend, May 24-27, 2002.** This will be a unique trip and a first, considering all the options. You need to begin your planning **NOW, as you will see below.** This will be an excellent trip for people age 6-77. This trip will have the options of one of three trips. You will choose one. The **first is the Traditional Lower New River**, the "Grand Canyon of the East" and will be for people age 15 and up.

The second trip will be the Kid-Friendly trip on the Upper New River. This section is suitable for beginners, kids and those warting a more laid-back adventure. "Duckies" are also an option here. A Ducky is a one or two person inflatable kayak. These are stable, maneuverable, easy to paddle and tons of fun. The kids seem to love them and so do the adults. This section is rared Class—and II. There is NO chance of the boat tipping or anyone being knocked overboard. Minimum age is 6.

The third trip is a new one. If is called "Team Extreme" as it is an <u>intense and aggressive whitewater experience</u>. It is also on the Lower New River. They use small rafts for 4 or 5 people (as opposed to 7 or 8) per raft. They provide intense instructional orientation and they encourage you to be in top physical snape. Minimum age is 18.

All three trips will go on the same day, May 26, 2001 (Sunday). Once again we will be using ACE Adventures Company. Every raft will have a trained guide. The cost will cover rafting and all three (Hot) meals that day. The cost will range from about \$70 for kids, \$130 for adults and \$170 for the "Extreme" experience (which can only be booked in groups of 4 or 5).

As far as lodging goes you have some options.

- 1. Camping (\$30) for 3 nights, I will also collect for this if you want.
- 2. Cabin Tenta (\$99, for 3) for 3 nights
- 3. Lake View A-frame Cabins, with hot tub bathroom and more (\$345, for 4 people) for 3 nights.
- 4. "Cozy Cabins" (similar to #3 but bigger inside)
- Two Bedroom Chalets (\$215, for 6 people, per night) and its filled with all kinds of special things.

*! strongly recommend #5, 4, or 3, but you need to ACT NOW and SEND IN YOUR DEPOSIT. They have a very limited supply. This could make this long weekend more of a vacation, certainly a more luxury one. So call:
