Trip Dates: Sunday, Aug. 24 to Sunday, Aug. 31, 2003





Each year since then he has provided SOLAR with trekking poles so that we can evaluate them for his company. Gianpietro has made many modifications to his poles as a result of feedback provided by SOLAR members.

Great Recipe Idea: Tortilla French Toast

I egg or ¼ cup liquid egg substitute or reconstituted powered egg ½ cup reconstituted powdered milk 8-6 inch flour tortillas lopping options: jam, brown sugar and cinnamon, maple syrup

coming in September is one of SOLAR's most popular classes, the beginning Backpacking Class.
Beginning Backpacking teaches basics about trip planning, equipment, food, and other backpacking issues. It also gives you hands on experience at practicals, funtimes, and newfriends.

This class is for those of you that a) never backpacked and have always wanted to try it, b) new members that need the class as a

prerequisite for other advanced classes or just to meet people, or c) members who just want a refresher or need an excuse to backpack.

Class begins September 3 and runs for five consecutive Wednesdays (9/3, 9/10, 9/17, 9/24 and 10/1). The weekend practicals are September 20 - 21 and October 3-5. Class time is from 6 to 9 pm.

In order to get a certificate for the class, you need to participate on a weekly basis and complete the entire 1' practical in September. The certificate for the class qualifies you for the Intermediate and Advanced Backpacking Classes, Wilderness Canoeing, and Enjoying Michigan Winters.

Locations for the classes and practicals are to be announced, however, we traditionally do our final practical at Pictured Rocks National Lakeshore. Stay tuned for final information at the August and September SOLAR meetings.

The only prerequisite for the class is that you are a current paid member of SOLAR and that you are interested in new experiences, new friends, or both!

Space is limited so sign up and payearly. The cost of the class is \$100 and includes a textbook, a class handbook, and most fees related to Practical 1. Please bring cash or a check payable to "SOLAR" when you sign up (Sorry, no credit cards.) This will guarantee your spot in the class.

JOHN BRYAN STATE PARK - Doyton, Ohio CLIFTON GORGE STATE NATURE PRESERVE

CAMPING, HIKING, BIKING, CANOEING, ROCK CLIMBING, REPELLING

SEPTEMBER 12 - 14, 2003

Come join S.O.L.A.R. as we explore John Bryan State Park and Clifton Gorge State Nature Preserve, just South of Dayton, on September 12, 14, 2003

John Bryan is the most scenic State Park in Western Ohio. The park contains a remarkable limestone gorge cut by the Little Miami River, which is designated as a state and national Scenic River. A portion of the gorge itself is designated as a national natural landmark. Nature lovers can enjoy any of the ten different trails found in the park. The trails follow the scenic river gorge and meander through majestic woodlands.

Drive down Friday night (3 ½ - 4 hours) and spend 2 nights camping and exploring. This is going to be a loosely organized Irip. There are a lot of things to do in the area. The main plan is to hike the trails at John Bryan State Park and Clifton Gorge State Nature Preserve. If there is time, we can pike part of the 100 mile paved bike path that is in nearby Little Miami State Park.

If you wish to canoe, there are canoe liveries in the area. Also, you will need to register with the park if you want to rock climb or rappel. I will not be bringing rock climbing gear down.

There will be the traditional SOLAR (toomuch food) potluck or Saturday night. The rest of your meals you will be on your own. Bring a camp stove, and rain tarp (just in case).

All this fun can be yours for \$10 adults, \$5 k i d s under 18 and \$5 dogs (must be on leash).



Kayaking is a very fun, safe and exciting water sport, when proper paddling and safety techniques are used. Michigan has many aptions for world class paddling adventures. Small private lakes, famous rivers and incredible National Sea Shores surround as. Experiencing any of these from a kayak is more than just a memorable experience.

Learn correct paddling and rescue techniques from a certified ACA kayak instructor. Introduction to kayaking classes are listed below and more advanced kayaking class will be scheduled, based on demand.

Saturday, August 16th . Saturday, September 13th

Additional times and dates can be made available based on individual and group needs.

Class Times 12:00 Noon till 4:00 PM

Location: TBD options include-(Cass Lake, Island Lake, Heavner's or a lake of your choice) — Class size will be limited to no more than 6 students. More advanced kayak classes can be scheduled for advanced paddlers or graduate students

Price: \$50.00 with equipment or \$30.00 with your own equipment

All kayaking equipment will be provided. You will receive a list of what to expect and what you need to bring. Classes will cover topics on land and on the water. Discussions and demonstrations related to selecting a kayak to car topping and transporting a kayak will be covered. Busic puddle strokes, rescue techniques will be demonstrated and practiced.

The end of the class will include some fun and relaxing haddling. Advanced rescues, Eskimo rolling or rolling Eskimos, extreme surfkayaking and going over waterfalls will not be covered... at least not in the Introduction Class.

All classes scheduled are introductory Classes. Students may sign up for more than one class and have a chance to practice skills learned in previous classes. Depending on class size and existing skilllevel of students, classes confocus on specific group requested skills.

Matt Dalton is an ACA certified knyck instructor, he knycks locally and he has knycked in 4 of the Great Lakes, California, Oregon, Texas, Florida and Alaska.


