

It's that time of year again – time for the 24th annual Carter Caves Crawla-thon. What is a crawla-thon you might ask — this is an annual event put on by Carter Caves State Park in Olive Hill, Kentucky. It is a great way for people to get acquainted with caving a wide variety of cave tours are offered, ranging from walking tours, a little bit of crawling, a lot of crawling and vertical caving. There are even trips for kids and seniors.! If you do not like the underground, join us anyway, as there is some great hiking in the area.



The basic plan is to drive down to the park on Friday, about a 7-hour drive. Rooms are available right at the Carter Caves Ledge, as well as at Carroll's Inn, about 15 miles (around the bend). The cost for 2 nights lodging is \$50 per adult and \$30 per child 16 and under, payable to SOLAR. Since this trip will fill up, only payments in full will be accepted to hold your spot.

You will need to download the crawl-a-thon entry and release forms yourself from <a href="www.crawlathon.com">www.crawlathon.com</a>, or call the park at (606) 286-4411. Generally the torms are not available until mid December. If you go to the sight before the forms are available, you can sign up to receive notification the very day they are available. You will



then need to send in both forms yourself with a check for \$30 (last year's fee, the current fee could be higher) to Carter Caves. Your \$30 includes 2 days of guided caving and a T-shirt from the event. Please DO NOT delay as the trips fill up quickly.

See me at the meeting for a listing of equipment you may need. SOLAR has helmets, knee and elbow pads (limited) and headlamps (limited) that you may borrow. A refundable deposit is required. I do not have enough equipment for everyone, so you will need to reserve in advance. To be fair, those who have not been on SOLAR caving trips previously will get first dibs on pads and headlamps.

Solar Hint on Finger Clock by Debbie Zuchlewski.

To estimate the time to sunset, hold your hands at arm's length, palms facing you so that your fingers line up under the sun, parallel to the horizon. Each finger (not including the thumb) that will fit between the sun and the horizon counts for lifteen minutes. Therefore, two fingers are thirty minutes; six are an hour and a half.

Solar Hint on Free Pot Set by Debbie Zuchlewski.

You can use aluminum cans (and a pot lifter) for pots and a tin pie plate as a lid. Bend a spout into one of the cans and call it a kettle. They are light-weight and work well as an alternative to a more expensive or heavier pot set. Only use sturdy cans that have no lining and are manufactured in North America. Don't try to fry in them; it doesn't work.




