Dave a n d DeFrance and Charlotte Zinkus invited me to join them the last week of January in Yellowstone, I had to consider if I wanted to leave home during my favorite season in Northwest Michigan, winter, cross-country somewhere ski else, and if so, if

When

Yellowstone was where I wanted to ski, rather than other destinations. Yellowstone won by a landslide, since there really is nowhere else that can compare to cross-country skiing among thermals, bison and other wildlife, and along the north and south rims of the "Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone River!"

Since I may not get back for another winter trip in the future, and wanted to see and do everything while there, Charlotte agreed to join me for 2 extra days beforehand, skiing the Rendezvous (popular for racing camp) and Riverside Trails in West Yellowstone first.

Charlotte had never visited Old Faithful, and the geysers are even more spectacular in winter! Ooh-la-la, pure magic, sparkling in the sun! Yellowstone really is the Disneyland of geysers, hot springs, steam vents (fumaroles), and mud pots - a geologic and scenic

wonder!

Since I am so very coldnatured I was worried that I wouldn't be warm enough, but Mother Nature came through for me, with perfect 20-degree Michigan-like weather: mostly sunny, verv little wind, and perfect snow conditions. The only cold day was my last,

minus 8 degrees at Big Sky while downhill skiing, as that HUGE storm was getting ready to blow across the country.

So, here's more on our Yellowstone adventure.

We left West Yellowstone on Saturday, January 22 on

the Xanterra snowcoach. We entered Yellowstone National Park along the wildlife (bison, elk, swans, ducks, bald eagle) corridor, heading east along the Madison River, then south along the Firehole River to the Old Faithful Snow Lodge. We visited the exhibits at the new Visitor Center, walked the Upper Geyser Basin, and watched Old Faithful erupt 3 times on a sunny, warm afternoon. After dinner we enjoyed the

snowcoach "Steam, Stars and Winter Soundscapes" tour, under a star-filled, clear, dark sky.

Since Yellowstone Expeditions would not be picking us up until after lunch on Sunday the 23rd, we took the shuttle south to Spring Creek, skiing the Divide Trail through the narrow, undulating gorge to the Lone Star Geyser. From there, a gradual uphill through the forest on the Howard Eaton Trail north of Shoshone Lake, then a gradual, winding downhill through a burn area, with views of Old Faithful to the east. We wound up, down and around on the Fern Cascades Trail before heading back to Old Faithful. Charlotte and I joined Moe and Dave DeFrance and our guide, Tom, for the snowcoach trip back to Madison, continuing north to the Norris junction along the Gibbon River, then east to the Canyon Skiers Yurt Camp, between the Ranger Station and the campground. We settled in, hanging our clothes

on the pegs in our 2-person, propane-heated yurtlets, before our hearty, family-style dinner in the dining room yurt.

On Monday, January 24, our guides, Sarah and Tom, chose the Clear Lake Trail to Forest Hot Springs in East Hayden Valley for our morning ski from the south rim of the "Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone River." At lunch, we basked in the 20-degree sunshine, surrounded by steaming fumaroles and bubbling mud pots. When we returned to the trail, we skied to Artist Point for views of the Lower Falls. It was dramatic - a huge, frozen column, like the waterfalls in Michigan's Upper Peninsula. Afterwards, we

stopped for afternoon photos of the Upper Falls before returning to camp.

Since we still had time for another ski, Dave, Charlotte and I joined Tom on the Roller Coaster Trail through the Canyon Campground, where I caught air

on a bump at the bottom of the steepest hill, then slalomed before doing a face plant. When we came out of the woods, we headed down North Rim Drive to Inspiration Point, skiing the Canyon Rim Trail to Grandview and Lookout Points, with views of Artist Point, the Lower Falls and the hill we'd climbed and descended earlier in the day. At Lookout, Sarah met us, breaking trail on the North Rim Hiking Trail along the ridgeline to the brink of the Lower Falls, where our snowcoach was parked for a ride back to camp. What a great way to start our visit, a "double your pleasure, double your fun" kind of day, all warm and sunny!

Since Moe had not had a chance to ski this season in Flagstaff or Colorado, and was trying to get over a bad cold, she went on a wildlife tour on Tuesday, while the rest of us took the snowcoach up to the Dunraven Pass Trail, where the road to Tower is closed for the winter. From there, Dave,

Charlotte and I skied with Tom up to the pass and Mt. Washburn trailhead, then down through deep snow in the woods and across Sulphur Creek to East Washburn (Jimmy Hoffa) Hot Springs. The mud pots and steam vents helped keep us warm, along with some hot tea in a thermos, during lunch on a cloudy day. Of course, what comes down must go back up... we switchbacked up, up, up to the road, then skied down to our yurt camp at Canyon.

Sarah chose an easy, flat, shorter ski for Wednesday for Moe, Dave, Charlotte and me from the yurt camp to Cascade Lake. First, we skied through the winding creek and meadow, where 2 pairs of bison were enjoying the sunshine and some "cardboard" grass, buried 3 feet deep in the snow, sweeping their big heads back and forth to unearth it. When we reached the frozen lake for lunch, I decided to ski back on

my own, enjoying a faster pace and an opportunity to head out to Hayden Valley for an afternoon of wildlife viewing. I saw coyotes devouring the remains of a cygnet, 2 red foxes on a ridge, and a gorgeous sunset. Almost a 3 dog day!

We started Thursday on a sunrise snowcoach tour through Hayden Valley to Yellowstone Lake, but Mother Nature didn't cooperate, since we were fogged in too much to

see any wildlife. So, Dave, Charlotte and I got a later start with Sarah at 11:00 a.m., as the sun came out on our ski west from Hayden Valley along Alum Creek, among herds of bison, to Violet Hot Springs for lunch and a soak. At Carcass Flat, an elk's skull, skeleton, one leg and hoof were picked clean in the snow. This was an easy, flat ski again, so we had plenty of time to relax in the creek flowing out of the hot springs, in the rock bathtubs under the 3-foot waterfall. As Charlotte and I were enjoying the steam, I looked up and saw 2 bison crossing the creek below us within 15 feet. After a while longer, I became too hot, wrapped up in my camp towel, only to see that 10 more bison were heading for the creek crossing nearby, too near for me to get back into my ski clothes. So, I backed up in my Crocs, while they made their way across the creek, the last one pausing to eyeball me. I assured him I was not a blade of grass (green towel), and this was not Madrid! As he ran across, I was sure glad he did not head my way!



On Friday a new guide, Kyle, accompanied Charlotte and me back into East Hayden Valley, through meadows and thermal areas in the sun, to our lunch spot along frozen Wrangler Lake, where Charlotte took off one of her skis and sank down 2 feet (she's 5"10", so above her knee). From there, we followed the winding Sour Creek valley until it narrowed to 12-15 feet, skiing along its edge through the gorge, which looked like a 5-layer chocolate cake, with 5 layers of white icing each. As we skied back across the meadows and up the hill, the afternoon sun became red, layender and

gold on the Washburn Range to the north, before a telemark back to the Upper Falls parking lot to meet our snowcoach pick-up.

For our last full day on Saturday, the snowcoach took us through Hayden Valley along the Yellowstone River, to the north side of Yellowstone Lake and the Pelican Valley Trail. Arden, the owner, led our group this day and broke trail with me, while Moe, Dave, Charlotte, Paul and Dominic followed behind. We skied north through the creek meadow, around some bison, and up through the woods and meadows to Sulphur Hills, where we enjoyed a warm, sunny lunch. From there we hiked up to the Valley of Death, surrounded by steam vents and "ghost" trees caked with frozen snow. We enjoyed views of the Absaroka Mountains to the east and the Tetons to the south. Since the trail was clearly marked, Arden allowed us to ski back on our own, and I enjoyed a faster pace down, switchbacking through the woods.

On Sunday we planned to depart camp at 11:00 a.m., so I chose to ski Roller Coaster to the North Rim again, on my own, while the others packed up and skied out to Inspiration Point. Afterwards, we loaded our bags and skis for our final group ski at Virginia Cascades, along the Gibbon River between Canyon and Norris, on our way back to West Yellowstone before going our own ways: Moe, Dave and Paul to Lamar Valley to watch wolves, Charlotte to fly home to Detroit, and me to Big Sky to downhill ski on Monday.

Arden, Tom, Sarah, Adam, Kyle, Dominic and Erica with Yellowstone Expeditions worked hard to make this a memorable adventure for us. It was another trip-of-a-lifetime! Yellowstone is truly a winter traveler's paradise, when all of the thermals and are wildlife silhouetted in the pristine, sparkling white snow! For more



On Tuesday, May 3, SOLAR will hold its annual Steering Committee elections. By running for one of the Steering Committee positions, or just by participating in the voting process, you can have a say in the direction SOLAR is moving. All currently paid members are eligible to run and vote. No experience is necessary – just a willingness to work collaboratively with others to make SOLAR the best outdoor club it can be.

SOLAR is a loosely formed volunteer organization made up of people who enjoy the outdoors. SOLAR Steering Committee members are volunteers who give their personal time to participate in a larger way for the good of the club. SOLAR is what our members make it.

The Steering Committee holds its business meetings on the last Tuesday of each month. In a club made up of people who love to travel and have adventures, it is understood that Steering Committee members may not be able to attend every meeting. However, it is important that members attend as many meetings as possible.

All positions are considered open until voting concludes on May 3. The Steering Committee is comprised of the following positions:

- President (Officer) Presides at General Membership and Steering Committee meetings.
- Vice President (Officer) Assists President and stands in for him/her when necessary.
- Secretary (Officer) Informs members of General Membership and Steering Committee

- meetings, records the minutes of Steering Committee meetings, makes required reports, carries out necessary correspondence.
- Treasurer (Officer) Has custody of SOLAR funds, processes bank deposits and expense reimbursements, provides the Steering Committee with an accounting of income and expenditures at monthly meetings.
- Education (Committee Chair) Coordinates and promotes educational programs offered through SOLAR; develops and maintains related guidelines; assists and supports members who develop, instruct, organize and/or promote these programs and explore new areas that may be of interest to members of SOLAR.
- Membership (Committee Chair) Strengthens and expands the membership of SOLAR; maintains membership records and mailing lists; provides new members with information about SOLAR.
- Activities (Committee Chair) Promotes activities in keeping with the purpose of SOLAR; maintains and revises Activities Guidelines; provides assistance to SOLAR members who organize and/or promote Activities.
- Programs (Committee Chair) Arranges, develops, and assists in carrying out the programs presented at the general membership meetings.
- Public Relations (Committee Chair) Promotes SOLAR activities and organizes and publishes other materials for the good of SOLAR.
- SOLAR Ray Editor (Committee Chair) -Organizes and publishes the SOLAR Ray

- newsletter; ensures that all official SOLAR communications are consistent with club policies.
- Equipment (Committee Chair) Establishes guidelines for the loaning and use of all SOLAR property; maintains inventories; monitors the condition, and oversees the storage, maintenance and procurement of SOLAR property.
- Historian (Committee Chair) Compiles records of SOLAR activities (written, photographs, etc.) to document SOLAR's success in fulfilling its mission.
- By-Laws (Committee Chair) Ensures that SOLAR actions and activities are consistent with the By-laws; recommends changes to the By-laws to meet changing needs.
- Web Master (Committee Chair) Maintains SOLAR's online presence through the website, Meetup and Facebook.

You can also review SOLAR's **By-laws** on our website. If you are interested in running for a position or have any questions, please contact Debbie Zuchlewski at SolarPrograms@SolarOutdoors.org. Please submit your name and the position you would like to run for to Debbie by April 7 to be included in the May SOLAR Ray article listing the Steering Committee candidates. The final deadline to submit your name in order to appear on the printed ballot is April 29. After April 29 you can select to be a write -in candidate. All candidates will have an opportunity to introduce themselves at the May 3 SOLAR meeting before the voting takes place.








