What You Said Report of General Membership Survey Now Available by Ati Tislerics

In March, 2011 the Steering Committee conducted a survey of all current SOLAR members via the Survey Monkey website. Thank you to all who participated. We received responses from 134 people, which means there's a lot to digest. The timing of the survey was a bit unfortunate in that the results became available shortly before the annual Steering Committee elections, and a bunch of new people took office soon after. Now that the new SC is getting its bearings, we're again looking at the survey results and figuring out how we can use them to make a better SOLAR.

One issue we've been discussing is whether and how to share the survey responses with the full membership. I'm sure some of you have been hoping to see them, while others would not want your responses shared. Actually, both points of view are represented

within the SC itself. (Of course, all responses are anonymous – no one knows who said what, but human nature being what it is, people will speculate...) We recognize that we've made some inconsistent statements regarding sharing the results. We've decided to publish the tabulated statistical data for all questions, along with summaries of the comments. We hope this will satisfy the curious while addressing any concerns about anonymity.

I've had the challenging task of summarizing the survey comments in a way that will protect respondents' anonymity while still being informative. It's a somewhat subjective exercise and I apologize if you feel your particular feedback has been given short shrift. I was looking for themes; when two or more comments seemed to address a similar theme, it is represented in the summary report. If you don't see your point of view represented, it most likely means you're the only person who made that particular point. Even so, rest assured that your comments have been read and considered by the SC, but we do

have to give greater attention to the more common themes.

As to what we're doing with the input you provided, you've seen some outcomes already (e.g., publishing SC meeting minutes). Now that the new SC is getting settled in, each of us is taking a close look at the survey responses to identify needs that we can address within our area(s) of responsibility. Watch for these efforts over the remainder of this SC term. Some needs will be more easily and quickly addressed than others and there are sure to be some that we simply can't address, given the nature of the club and/or our limited SC time and energy. We will also be looking to the broader membership to help. As always, SOLAR is what you make of it!

The survey report is available on the SOLAR Yahoo! Group (Files > General Membership Survey). A special thanks goes out to Heather Hall, who oversaw the construction of the survey, and Jackie Ostrosky, who ran it in Survey Monkey and prepared the initial report.



hike.






Tom Hayes:

How long have you been a member of SOLAR?

I joined SOLAR in spring of 2004 so I guess that would make it about 7 1/2 years.

How did you learn about SOLAR?

I remember seeing SOLAR listed in the events section of the Free Press a long time ago and decided to check it out. I went to a meeting and they were talking about the Basic Land Navigation class. It sounded interesting so I became a member so I could participate. I enjoyed the class and had a great time on the practical. I was sold on SOLAR as a group.

What are some outdoor activities you enjoy?

I enjoy doing a lot of different activities outdoors. As long as I'm outdoors I am happy. Some of my main activities include hiking, backpacking, mountain biking and canoeing, although I'm usually up for trying just about anything else outdoor related.

What has been your favorite trip/activity so far?

That's really a hard one to answer. I've gone on a lot of great trips since I've been in SOLAR. Even the many short weekend trips that I've done have been a lot of fun, especially when you're with a great group of people; then any trip is great. If I had to pick just one trip as my all time favorite I would have to say the Algonquin canoe trip I did with a bunch of SOLAR folk back in 2005. Then again, summiting Mt. I'm not sure I have an ideal trip. There are a lot of things I look for in a trip but I think as long as it involves good friends, scenic vistas and maybe a good euchre game then it's pretty much ideal.

Which classes have you taken through SOLAR? What class (es) do you wish were offered that are not currently?

I've taken pretty much all of the classes that SOLAR has offered in the time that I have been a member. I guess that would include Basic and Intermediate Backpacking, Winter Camping (EMW) and Winter Survival, Basic Land Nav, First Aid, Search & Rescue, Rock Climbing, Mountaineering, Adventure Racing, Basic Paddling, what else.... a few one-time classes, light weight backpacking (I failed that course apparently), and the cooking class (failed that as well; still learning to improve my backcountry cooking skills).

I would like to see a course offered on long paddling trips (canoe or kayak). I've done trips like this but would like to learn more.
