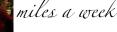

Please continue to spread the good word, and invite people to check out SOLAR.

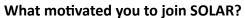

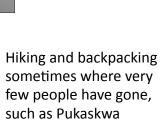

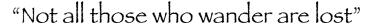

Porcupine Mountains Winter Camping

When: Sunday, February 26 - Saturday, March 3; five days/four nights in the backcountry.

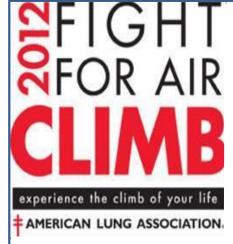
Group size will be limited to six initially; that could (and hopefully will) increase if there is enough interest from people with winter camping experience beyond the EMW class.
